A MESSAGE FROM OUR COMMUNITY LAY DIRECTOR

Think of a Christmas when you were very young, when you weren't caught up in the scramble it may have become now. You looked forward to the school recess or the Christmas Vacation, as it was called then. You anticipated snow, sledding, building a snowman and a fort and snowball fights. You may have made a Christmas present for your parents in Sunday school or took bottles to the store for the refund so you could buy Mom some little trinket. Mom helped you with Dad's gift. Your biggest problem was learning the lines and practicing for the church nativity program. You attended a Christmas Eve service, maybe got to open one present and were shooed off to bed (so your parents could finish Santa's work) and woke up earlier than the folks wanted you to. But they got up anyway and the fun began. Then Grandparents arrived in time for the big meal. Afterwards you showed off your gifts and played in the snow.

We headed home on Christmas Eve in our 1931 Chevrolet that Dad had bought with a \$75 loan. Mom pointed to all the lighted trees in people's windows to make up for us not having one. No freeways so we drove by a lot of homes. We made it to Desert Center (not sure if it was Nevada or Arizona but I remember the town's name) and the Chevy was having problems so we stopped at a motel there. I wondered if Santa would be able to find us in such a remote place. He did (I'm pretty sure with help from Mom 'cause Dad was busy fixing the car) and on Christmas morning I got a real nice, big toy truck. Wow! What a super surprise. It was special!

What an opportunity we have now to share our Christmas. Try to slow down once in a while, think about the First Christmas Gift, a baby boy born in poverty so that we might be rich. Think about what joy you can give to others – family, friends – and take advantage of the many ways to share with strangers through the Salvation Army, Toys for Tots, Angel Tree, Samaritan's Purse Shoe Boxes and so many more. Choose one or two and "just do it". May the spirit of the Christ Child bless you and yours.

ATTENTION SPONSORS

Sponsorship has a very important place in the Emmaus process. After all, no one would be taking a Walk to Emmaus without a sponsor who willingly and lovingly takes the responsibility to 1)Ask, 2)help with an application, 3)make sure the application is delivered to the registrar, 4)keep in touch and let the pilgrim know what to expect while they wait for a call, 5)send notices to friends and family, asking for letters when the call to attend is received, 6)make sure the pilgrim has a ride to the church and help in getting registered and settled, 7)attend the sponsors' hour, 8)pray for the pilgrim and the entire walk, 9)make sure all letters are delivered to the agape personnel, 10)care for the pilgrim's family during the weekend, 11)attend candlelight and closing, 12)make sure the pilgrim has a ride home, 13)help the pilgrim find a share group and continue to love them.

That is quite a list but when followed, the blessings far outweigh any efforts or inconveniences. Now here is a very short list of what a sponsor should not do.

1. **Do not give special gifts to the pilgrim during the walk.** Each pilgrim is given the same love and acceptance. Special gifts to one or two draw attention to those receiving and may make other sponsors who follow the rules seem less loving. Even a flower or whatever can cause a problem. The team and the agape personnel work hard to make sure all pilgrims receive the same tokens of love. Please do not sabotage this concept. If there is a birthday or an occasion that should be noted, let the team know and they will handle it appropriately.
2. **Do not include special gifts for the agape packet given near the end of the walk.** This should be for letters and cards only. Special gifts can be given on the ride home. The team will try to assure that each pilgrim has an adequate supply of agape in the packet and specialty items do not fit into the packets and also can cause the same problem as No. 1 above.
3. **Do not make any extraordinary contact with your pilgrim during the walk.** Be a help at meals, let them know you love them, but keep the conversation short and appropriate to the intention of the walk. Remember, being a true servant means keeping in the background as much as possible.
4. **Do not leave your pilgrim stranded after the walk.** Make sure they have a way home and keep in contact, helping with questions, share group, advice, encouraging them to fill out the willing servant sheet, etc.

It's really not at all difficult being a sponsor. All you have to do is care enough and God will bless you and the pilgrim.
