## A MESSAGE FROM OUR COMMUNITY LAY DIRECTOR

Just finished mowing the front yard. No time for the back right now. We sure spend a lot of time and effort and money to keep lawnmowers running—not to mention putting our fingers and feet in danger. Why do we work so hard at such things week after week? Is it pride? Why do we shine our shoes or wash our cars? Is there a label for this constant, expensive, time consuming activity?

A friend and I have discussed pride and we both agree it can be a very bad thing. We take pride in football and baseball teams, our town, our house, our family and our country. Many times we have done nothing or very little to make some of them what they are.

On Emmaus teams we recite the Emmaus Canon at each team meeting. Through it we promise to not be prideful but to recognize and be available to the workings of the Holy Spirit. Sometimes it is hard to live by that promise when we have had a successful encounter even though we know it is God's miracle that is thrilling us. Nancy Leigh DeMoss was having coffee several years ago and began writing on a napkin the differences between prideful and "broken" people. Here are just a few of them.

## **PRIDEFUL**

Quick to blame

Concerned with being respectable, protecting their image and reputation

Difficult to share spiritual needs

Covers up mistakes or sins

Hard time saying, "I was wrong"

Deals in generalities if confessing

Compare themselves to others and feel worthy of honor

Nothing to repent of but pretty sure others do Independent, self-sufficient spirit

Desire to be a success

Feel confident in how much they know Keep others at arms' length

## BROKEN

Accepts personal responsibility, gracious when others make a mistake Concerned with being real and with what God knows Open and transparent as God directs Willing to be exposed Admits failure and seeks forgiveness Acknowledges specifics when confessing Compare themselves to the holiness of God and desperate for His mercy Continual heart attitude of repentance Recognize their need for others Motivated to be faithful and to make others a success Humbled by how much they have to learn Willing to risk getting close and loving

## SPIRITUAL DIRECTOR'S THOUGHTS

The story is told of a group of farmers who looked over their crop of potatoes and chose the biggest ones for their own tables. The rest, after all, were decent size and suitable for people who didn't know they were doing without the best. What they didn't know wouldn't hurt them. They sold some and planted the rest.

They kept up this practice year after year and really enjoyed those great big fluffy baked potatoes. And their wives (or spouses, if that suits you) appreciated not having to peel a lot of little potatoes when they wanted mashed.

After a number of years, the farmers noticed that the potatoes coming out of their fields grew smaller and smaller. They got their heads together and blamed beetles. They sprayed for beetles and again took the largest potatoes for themselves. The next year, there were no beetles but the potatoes were smaller yet. The discussed the matter and decided it was blight. They sprayed for blight and beetles and once more took the largest potatoes for themselves. The next year, there were no beetles and no blight but the potatoes were the smallest they had ever been. They decided it must have been the weather and decided to see what next year brought.

The next year they sprayed for blight and beetles, the rains came at the right time and the sun shone every other day but the potatoes turned out to be not much larger than shooter marbles.

Why do you think their potatoes decreased in size every year? Isn't it obvious?

Yet how many of us are keeping the very best things in life for ourselves and investing the leftovers? Whether we are talking about what we give to God, what we use to help others or what we invest in education or retirement or society, many people are keeping the best and only giving the small potatoes.
